










% Change in Cuyahoga County Children with Primary Care Visits, 2019 vs. 2020






% Missing Well-Child Visit – 2020

By Whether Child Had a 2020 Well-Child Visit (regional data)




Children without a 2020well-child visit were67% more likely to bemissing a lead order









Includes vaccinations across Ashtabula, Cuyahoga, Lake, and Summit Counties, 1/1/21 – 7/22/21






