

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## The Value of Family Caregivers

Without family-provided help, the economic cost to the U.S. health and long term services and supports (LTSS) systems would skyrocket. <sup>2</sup>

- $\bullet$  Informal caregiving accounts for approximately 30 billion hours of care annually  $^{\rm 3}$
- Family caregivers are responsible for producing 80% of the total estimated economic value of community-based long-term services and supports for older adults <sup>4</sup>
- Family caregiver involvement decreases emergency room visits and hospital utilization <sup>5</sup>




## The Role Family Caregivers Play

Family caregiving today is more complex, costly, stressful, and demanding than ever before. Caregivers don't just care for physical conditions like wounds; they care for dementia and other cognitive impairment disorders. <sup>6</sup>



More than half of these caregivers also monitor their family member's mental health and related behavior of those who do, almost half find it to be stressful or extremely stressful. <sup>6</sup>

## The Support Family Caregivers Need

Family caregivers often feel invisible, isolated, and unprepared for the tasks they are expected to perform, and caregiving—especially when it involves an intensive commitment over the long term—carries significant costs.

- Family caregivers spend 4.6 years on average as a caregiver
- They have higher rates of depressive symptoms, anxiety, stress, and emotional difficulties
- Research has shown that education and skills training can improve caregiver confidence in managing daily care challenges; caregiver skill building and environmental modifications can improve quality of life for family caregivers and care recipients

In September 2021, the Recognize, Assist, Include, Support, and Engage (RAISE) Family Caregiving Advisory Council delivered its initial report to Congress.<sup>8</sup> This report included a comprehensive review of the current state of family caregiving and 26 recommendations for how the federal government, states, tribes, territories, and communities – in partnership with the private sector – can better Recognize, Assist, Include, Support, and Engage family caregivers. Family caregivers are the backbone of our nation's healthcare system. All stakeholders across the healthcare ecosystem should consider how they can do more to value, support and engage this selfless workforce of 53 million. Now is the time to expand the national conversation on caregiving and continue to bring together key stakeholders to engage family caregivers so they can get access to the supports and services they so desperately deserve.
