REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL

Bearing a yoke does not seem to be an enjoyable experience. But Jesus gives us this image in today's gospel reading and nearly subverts it.

The yoke of Jesus, the one who is meek and humble of heart, is itself easy; the burden is light. In today's gospel, we learn that when we are true disciples of Christ, we conform to the person himself. So conformed, we find any apparent burden not to be a burden at all. We need only act as he would in the world, as another Christ to serve the needs of those around us.
