From the child and parent to the retired veteran and family, we provide serious and advanced illness care for all ages in all settings, wherever one calls home. Through our entire care continuum of Care Navigation, Home Care, Palliative Care, Hospice Care, Grief Services, Research & Innovations, and our Foundation, our staff have served over 10,000 individuals during our fiscal year of October 1, 2020 - September 30, 2021, and we remain committed to continuing to provide excellent care for many years to come. Just a few months ago we were recognized by HEALTHCAREfirst as a recipient of the Hospice Honors designation which showcases the quality care that we provide our patients and their loved ones.

Earlier this year we also received the 2021 Best of Home Care[®] Leader in Excellence Award. We are now ranked among the top 10% of home care providers participating in the nationwide Home Care Pulse Satisfaction Management Program. This recognition demonstrates our commitment to providing excellent care and quality improvement, for clients, their loved ones, and our emplovees.

In addition to outcomes in guality, we have also recently been awarded through Modern Healthcare's Best Places to Work annual nationwide survey as one of the top 50 Best Places to Work in the Healthcare Provider/ Insurer category. We are proud of and thankful for our employees and the tremendous care they provide to each other and to our community and we look forward to even more passionate individuals joining

our workforce. Thank you to our generous volunteers who give of their time and to our generous donors who together help make care possible.

Below are some highlights from Fiscal Year 2021. Read further in this edition to learn even more ways that we are expanding and investing in our communities this new vear.

Fiscal Year 2021 accomplishments:

- Care Navigation served 122 clients.
- Home Care served an average of 1240/hours a week to 101 clients.
- Palliative Care served over 4,425 patients, substantially more than years prior.
- Hospice admitted more than 2,500 patients to our care, 300 more than prior year.
- Grief Services Team scheduled over 3,400 individual sessions for children and adults to receive support.
- Our Music Therapy team completed over 5,000 music therapy visits with patients and families.
- Our two Home Stores brought in \$1.3M in net revenue.
- 1,723 donors made over \$1.1M in total financial contributions.
- Pinned a total of 715 Veterans since 2014 with 104 this fiscal vear.
- We continue to prepare for the opening of our second inpatient unit in Franklin, NC, where we will meet the needs of patients and families in our West Region in 2022.

Our family, friends, and neighbors with advanced heart disease need not suffer alone anymore.

In collaboration with the American Heart Association (AHA) and the National Partnership for Healthcare and Hospice Innovation (NPHI), Four Seasons announces its Advanced Cardiac Care (ACC) Program to address heart disease, one of the largest killers of Americans.


Available for immediate use, the program's patient and caregiver guide helps avert multiple hospital and emergency room visits that are a significant source of stress for the patient, their family, and the medical facility currently dealing with COVID-19 patients.

Each year, more Americans succumb to heart disease than any other condition. Heart disease is also a leading cause of hospitalization; patients with congestive heart failure alone account for more than one million inpatient admissions annually.

"It is an unnecessary tragedy that only five percent of heart failure patients who are discharged from the hospital ever utilize in-home hospice services," said Carole Fisher, President of NPHI. She further asserts, "Far too many die alone in a hospital or nursing facility, when instead our hospice teams could care for them wherever they reside and they could enjoy a far higher quality of life surrounded by loved ones."

NPHI is the national voice for 75 not-for-profit hospice and advanced illness care providers. NPHI's hospice and advanced illness care providers offer primary medical and lifestyle care at home, even for those heart failure patients who are not terminal.

Award criteria were based on Hospice CAHPS survey results for an evaluation period of October 2019 through September 2020. Award recipients were identified by evaluating performance on a set of 24 guality indicator measures. Performance scores were aggregated from all completed surveys and were compared on a guestion-by-guestion basis to a National Performance Score calculated from all hospices contained in the HEALTHCARE first's Hospice CAHPS database. Hospice Honors recipients include those hospices scoring above the HEALTHCAREfirst National Performance Score on 20 of the evaluated questions. Official duties followed as Flight Instructor in Corpus Christi; a Patrol Squadron in Jacksonville, FL; Staff Duty at the Nava Academy in Annapolis; and Ship's Company aboard the USS America (CV-66). In 1979, with so much time away and two young children at home, John made the decision to go into the Reserves. As a civilian, John worked for General Dynamics, United Technologies, ITT Defense, Raytheon, and worked as a Naval Officer on the weekends and in the summer. After he was promoted to Commander, he joined the Joint Deployment Agency in Tampa, FL.

But John's active-duty days were not over. When Saddam Hussein invaded Kuwait in 1990, John's reserve unit transitioned to active duty. Stationed at Scott AFB in Southern Illinois, John supported Desert Shield and Desert Storm for a year. He finally retired from the military after 28 years of service to our country.

After completely retiring in 2008, John's path brought him to North Carolina. John and Jan fell in love with Western North Carolina after their son visited and enrolled in

In 2019, the Four Seasons Foundation began planning and designing a new Veterans Memorial Garden outside Elizabeth House. Throughout 2020 and 2021, much work was completed on the garden including the installation of eight flags which are now proudly displayed: one for each Military branch, the American flag, and the MIA POW flag.

"Four Seasons is sincerely grateful to Dan and Nancy Barber for their vision of developing a special place in Henderson County where veterans would be remembered and honored. Four Seasons is pleased to have dedicated the Dan and Nancy Barber Veterans Memorial Garden on our Elizabeth House campus. "When conversations for this project began several years ago, Dan and Nancy Barber were guick to note they wanted to be part of a project where there would be opportunities for veterans to remembered in special ways. The garden spans 1,200 square feet and in addition to the Seven Stations of Honor Plaza, includes a pergola, designed as a shelter of peace and remembrance for visitors and patients alike. Memorial markers, bricks, and benches are available to pay tribute to family members and friends who served our country in any branch of service.

The Dan and Nancy Barber Veterans Memorial Garden will have many on-going opportunities to honor Veterans by purchasing inscribed paving stones, or dedicating benches or trees to a loved one's memory. Individuals or organizations may also wish to sponsor annual upkeep and development of the planting areas.

With over one-third of Four Seasons patients being Veterans and their own family history of military service, Dan and Nancy

beyond what they were able to cover. Jesse was not able to adequately care for Button by himself at their home and they were concerned about how she could continue to receive care at Elizabeth House.



In 2015, I applied to Four Seasons in anticipation of completing my music therapy internship in hospice. I was accepted and started at Four Seasons in June 2016. Over the next six months, I served as the primary contact for music therapy at the Elizabeth House, provided in-home music therapy visits, and facilitated monthly music therapy groups with older adults in facilities.

As time progressed, I discovered my passion for grief services by completing bereavement calls and providing grief support to families. I have a heart for working with children and adolescents. Blair Stockton, Child & Adolescent Grief Coordinator, was willing to have me work alongside her through Camp Heart Songs and individual adolescent grief sessions during my internship. It was a dream come true: an internship that combined music therapy, grief services, and children and adolescents.

As I pursued my master's degree in Music Therapy, I continued to stay connected with Four Seasons and volunteered as a music therapist for Camp Heart Songs in 2017 and 2018. I took every opportunity to work with grieving children and adolescents by volunteering for other bereavement camps in Western North Carolina. I continued to advance my skills, knowledge, and experience through a

successful defense of my thesis, the development of a music therapy program for another hospice, and as bereavement coordinator and counselor roles in hospice organizations.

In August 2020, I applied for a counselor position in the Compass program, participated in three interviews, and accepted an offer. I started in my role as Child & Adolescent Grief Counselor on October 5, 2020. I am not only passionate about providing grief support to children and adolescents but also the opportunity to bring access to services in areas that do not already have access to such services. I am the primary contact for the six most western regions of North Carolina, including Cherokee, Clay, Graham, Jackson, Macon, and Swain counties.

I am excited to expand the Compass services in these counties alongside the Grief Services department and the hospice team in the West region. I am proud to be a board-certified music therapist. I am honored to be a Child & Adolescent Grief Counselor. I am grateful to work for Compass. And I am thrilled to be "home" at Four Seasons. The best is yet to come!

Pediatric Care Fund

The Pediatric Care Fund provides care specifically for children with serious illnesses through Four Seasons' palliative care and hospice services. Four Seasons has been receiving referrals for pediatric care for many months because of a lack of care available for children in western North Carolina. As we began receiving requests from providers from as far away as Winston-Salem and Charlotte to treat children from our own community, we decided it is imperative that we provide the care that had been lacking. We want to alleviate further stress on families who are already stretched from having to care for a seriously ill child in addition to having to travel away from home, jobs, and other family members. Our Pediatric Care Fund will help us provide the specialized equipment as well as training necessary to help our youngest patients.

Cardiac Care Fund

Our Cardiac Care Fund will provide innovative care to those with advanced heart disease. By utilizing palliative and hospice care that will include protocols designed by cardiac care specialists, our Cardiac Care Program will assist patients and their care givers in managing breathing problems, fatigue, and other worsening symptoms. Care will be available 24/7 and help patients control their symptoms at home.
