Foundation earns statewide recognition for flood response

After a flood ravaged our community in June 2018, Portage Health Foundation stepped up to help those in need. To date, the foundation has expended more than \$2 million and helped raise \$950,000 in private and corporate donations to help those affected. In September 2019 that effort was recognized as PHF was given a Governor's Service Award in the Outstanding Volunteer Program category. Several board of directors and staff traveled to Detroit to accept the award and take part in the spirited festivities at the historic Fox Theatre.







By the time the police were at their house that afternoon, the two school-aged children had known for quite some time that something wasn't right. That knowledge didn't make things any easier for them as their parents were being taken away by police. The parents had been trafficking drugs - harming themselves, the buyers of their drugs and putting the children in danger.

You can imagine the emotions this would bring up for a child. Thanks to already-established partnerships, those children were far from lost in the crowd. The police had given their school a heads up that this was happening. The primary teachers and administration for the students knew to be ready when they pulled up. They knew extra attention was needed for those students and leaned heavily on the

trauma-informed best practices that they'd learned during professional development training sessions. They also knew their partnership with Dial Help to provide professional counseling at the school was about to be flexed.

There's never an easy way to get through these kinds of situations. But months later the students are no longer in danger from the illegal activities. They became closer to their teachers than ever before. Professional counseling helped them go through the emotions and turn toward a better tomorrow.

"Everything put in place like that was huge for us," said one of the teachers at the school. "When they went home it was traumatic, but there was a plan and they had help at school."

The students didn't miss a single day of school because of it. Soon after the arrests, the work began to help the parents clean up so they could be reunited with their children.

"Many agencies do their best to protect these kids," said Jason Wickstrom, a member of Upper Peninsula Substance Enforcement Team West (UPSET West) that was on the scene that day. "Sometimes the only way to really protect them is to take a family member out of the house for a while. Hopefully open up some kind of treatment avenue so they can change their lifestyles and habits so they can be reunited with their children."

Ultimately that's the goal for the UPSET West team and having a strong relationship with the schools helps make that more likely.

"Knowing that the student has the support at school that they needed is one less thing that's in the back of your mind as you're trying to get into the house and secure everything," Wickstrom said. "Everyone on our team got in this to help people. We have seen where an addict was able to get back into their lives and are succeeding in holding down a job. At least being part of their children's life again. It's hard, but that is always what we want to see in these situations."

For the school, being prepared meant they were able to provide so much better care for their students.

"It might not sound like a lot to read this, but when you see that kid upset and crying, not knowing where they would be able to go, how they would get food, how they would even live their life, it's hard." the school teacher said. "We were able to go from that to a student thriving and doing incredible work — living up to their potential."

A key part of that is the offering by Dial Help. They activated their Mobile Response Team for this situation as they didn't have a counselor on-site at that school that day.

"It helps to have someone from the outside come in," said Mandy Daniels, a prevention specialist with Dial Help. "We have people that are always on call and can be there whenever something comes up. As you can imagine, things don't always happen during our scheduled hours."

That extra attention is also regularly available to the schools through a program called Youth One Stop. Dial Help staffers like Daniels regularly visit most of the schools in the Copper Country to help students with the day-to-day needs and establish the relationships needed to be top-of-mind when crisis strikes.

"For example, when there were a couple of students who died in L'Anse last year, we were called out to support those students," Daniels said. "The schools are so thankful for us. We hear it from teachers and administrators all the time."

It's this full circle of services mindset that the Portage Health Foundation takes into consideration with its funding. Cycles of drugs and addiction cause families to have trouble, so we fund training in the schools, fund professional support to the schools and enhance law enforcement resources to stop the problems at their root. If that ends up displacing a family, the training available at schools and through programs like Dial Help is there to assist the children.

These are three of dozens of agencies that the Portage Health Foundation works with to help our future generation have a better chance at success. If you have ideas for ways that we can fill gaps, connect dots and improve offerings in our community, we invite you to talk with us. All of these projects came from ideas presented to us by people in the community, and your idea could be the next piece in the puzzle to a healthier tomorrow for Copper Country residents.
