Heavy periods are most commonly treated with the progestin intrauterine device (IUD) or combination oral contraceptives...

Progestin intrauterine device

- · Decreases the amount of bleeding.
- · Improves quality of life.
- · Effective for preventing pregnancy.
- Placed in the uterus by a healthcare provider at an office visit.
- Once it is in, don't need to take any other medication for periods (effective for 5 years).
- To discontinue it, healthcare provider needs to remove it at an office visit.
- Women with certain abnormalities of their uterine cavity cannot use it.

Combination oral contraceptives

- · Decreases the amount of bleeding.
- · Improves quality of life.
- Effective for preventing pregnancy.
- Healthcare provider gives a prescription that is filled at the pharmacy.
- · Need to remember to take a medication every day.
- To discontinue it, the woman just stops taking the medication.
- Women with certain health conditions (such as high blood pressure, smokers over age 35 years) cannot use.

...but studies are needed to figure out which treatment is more effective at making women feel better.
