

Take, for instance, what is happening right now on our Women & Infants' campus where I had the opportunity to speak at the ribbon cutting ceremony last week for Women & Infants' Center for Women's Pelvic Medicine and Reconstructive Surgery, the clinical services of the Division of Urogynecology and Reconstructive Pelvic Surgery.

A tertiary care center, the Center for Women's Pelvic Medicine and Reconstructive Surgery faculty have expertise in the diagnosis and treatment of pelvic floor disorders such as urinary incontinence, pelvic organ prolapse, defecatory dysfunction, interstitial cystitis, and fistulas. With eight to 10 million women in the U.S. alone seriously affected by urinary incontinence and pelvic floor disorders,

these services are vital. Further, Women & Infants is one of just eight medical centers from across the U.S., and the only one in the northeast, to be selected by *The Eunice Kennedy Shriver* National Institutes of Child Health and Human Development to

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participate in the National Pelvic Floor Disorders Network (PFDN), working collaboratively to develop and perform research studies related to women with pelvic floor disorders. As if that were not enough, this program is the largest of its type across the nation.

Yet, despite its impressive stature and volume, the service had long made due with cramped quarters and other amenity deficits. Now, we can be proud that the staff has a physical location commensurate with their excellent care—and caring—which features more space, new technologies, enhanced privacy for patients, among many other benefits. Congratulations, Dr. Myers and your superb team of clinicians!

This is not the only significant development coming out of the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology this week. Our esteemed Chief of Obstetrics and Gynecology Maureen Phipps, MD, announces the appointment of a new director of the Division of Reproductive Endocrinology and Infertility (REI) Ruben Alvero, MD, FACOG, FACS, who arrives at the hospital today. Dr. Alvero is a recognized leader in the field of obstetrics and gynecology and reproductive endocrinology and infertility, and he has been at the forefront of new initiatives to improve patient care through quality initiatives, educational advancements and surgical innovation.

Hailing from the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at the University of Colorado School of Medicine, where he was the division director for REI and vice chairman for education and a professor of obstetrics and gynecology, he is a founding member of the University of Colorado's Center for Surgical Innovation and served on its board of directors.

Dr. Alvero is a graduate of Harvard University, and he earned his medical degree at the F. Edward Hebert School of Medicine, Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences in Bethesda, MD. He completed a residency in obstetrics and gynecology at Walter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, DC, and a fellowship in reproductive endocrinology and infertility at the National Institutes of Health. Named one of the Best Doctors in America by Best Doctors, Inc. since 2005, Dr. Alvero serves on the editorial boards of Reproductive Medicine Insights and Clinical Medicine: Case Reports and is a peer reviewer for The Journal of Pharmacology and Experimental Therapeutics, American Journal of Obstetrics and Gynecology, Human Reproduction, Fertility and Sterility, and Obstetrics and Gynecology.

We look forward to Dr. Alvero's leadership as he joins the great team of specialists in the Division of Reproductive Endocrinology and Infertility at Women & Infants.

This designation further signifies the hospital's commitment to ensuring that every woman who delivers a baby at Women & Infants Hospital of Rhode Island is offered the resources, the information, the support needed to help her and her baby get the best, healthiest start in life. Not only is this a wonderful achievement for Women & Infants Hospital, but it is a huge accomplishment for the State of Rhode Island. Women & Infants is now the second largest hospital in the U.S. to be designated as a Baby-Friendly® Hospital, second only to The Woman's Hospital of Texas which delivers approximately 10,000 babies each year (to Women & Infants' approximately 8,400). But this designation also means that Rhode Island will now rank number one in the country in the percentage of babies born at a Baby-Friendly® Hospital.


