### Care New England partners with Rhode Island College Institute for Education in Healthcare

Skills for Rhode Island's Future (Skills RI) is recruiting Care New England employees for the Community Health Worker Training Program in Providence, sponsored by the Rhode Island College Institute for Education in Healthcare. Care New England will be hiring community health workers at Women & Infants Hospital, Kent Hospital, Butler Hospital, and The Providence Center, as part of The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services grant.

Training will occur from January 8 to March 22 on Monday and Wednesday evenings from 5: 30 to 8:30 p.m., in addition to five Saturday mornings from 9 a.m. to noon (January 13, February 3, February 10, February 24, and March 17). Training will be held at Rhode Island College, 600 Mount Pleasant Avenue, Providence, RI 02908.

The program is designed to give participants the opportunity to learn the skills, knowledge, and responsibilities of a community health worker. A community health worker serves as a connector between members of their communities and health care providers and social services to ensure people are gaining access to the appropriate health services and care. ## The Department of Health declares widespread influenza in Rhode Island

Influenza can be a very serious infection leading to severe illness and even death. Flu vaccination provides protection from illness for many people, lessens severity of disease for others, and helps prevent spread within vulnerable populations.

For the safety of our patients and coworkers, and to prevent spread and outbreaks within our facilities, it is critical that each of us adheres to the following:

- · Eligible health care workers should already be vaccinated. If you have NOT yet been vaccinated and are eligible to receive vaccine, you should do it now.
- · Beginning immediately, unvaccinated workers must wear a mask whenever there is potential for direct contact with a patient. This includes both patient rooms and public areas where patients and families are present.
- Do not work if you are ill with flu symptoms. Working while sick places others at risk. You may return to work 24 hours after your fever has been gone while off fever-reducing medicines, and you are able to control your cough and secretions.
- Patients presenting with suspected flu illness should be placed immediately in a private room (or private area) under droplet precautions. Precautions are maintained for seven days after illness onset, or until 24 hours after the resolution of fever and respiratory symptoms, whichever is longer.
