Fertility Center awarded ultrasound practice accreditation

Women & Infants Fertility Center has been awarded ultrasound practice accreditation in the area(s) of gynecologic ultrasound and first-trimester obstetric ultrasound by the Ultrasound Practice Accreditation Council of the American Institute of Ultrasound in Medicine.

The Fertility Center achieved this recognition by meeting rigorous voluntary guidelines set by the diagnostic ultrasound profession. All facets of the practice were assessed, including the training and qualifications of physicians and sonographers; ultrasound equipment maintenance; documentation; storage, and record-keeping practices; policies and procedures to protect patients and staff; quality assurance methods; and the thoroughness, technical quality and interpretation of the sonograms the practice performs.

The Providence Center announces case manager career ladder



The Providence Center (TPC) recently rolled out its case manager career ladder, a tiered advancement framework for case managers that would like to further their careers. The program pairs a structured, on-the-job learning curriculum with required courses, and includes a salary increase upon completion of each of the three levels.

The project is part of a Care New England workforce development initiative in partnership with Apprenticeship RI to promote professional practice and competency as well as improve recruitment and retention. TPC and Anchor Recovery began a similar advancement initiative last year designed to help Anchor employees become licensed substance use treatment providers.

Vickie Walters, Care New England's director of workforce development, has been working to develop this program for over a year with input from current TPC case managers. "Case managers are the unsung heroes of behavioral health, and we wanted to provide them with something tangible to understand how they can meet expectations and be competent in their role," said Walters. "This effort will also help us improve care, because it's a way to evaluate competencies and make sure staff have adequate knowledge and tools to provide high quality care."

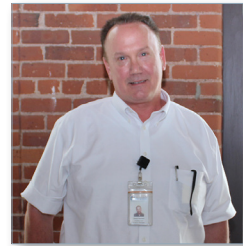
