Butler Hospital provides staff education regarding falls prevention

Research dictates that hospitalization increases patients' risk for falls, with nearly one million hospitalized patients in the United States experiencing a fall annually, and one-third of those resulting in injury. With an increased number of falls in inpatient units, Butler Hospital's Falls Prevention Committee has been reviewing current protocol and implementing action plans to reduce falls throughout all units. Staff education was provided all last week at Butler in order to share information about what can be done to help alleviate this problem. Topics included ECT Protocol, Orthostatic v.s. Protocol, Hydration, Falls Trivia, and Bob and the Ten Steps of Fall Prevention, which included a review of fall prevention strategies already being implemented on Butler's inpatient units.
