

As we continue our focus on Quality, Service, and Access, it is important to highlight Breast Cancer Awareness Month and the incredible work the teams at both Women & Infants and Kent hospitals do in providing life-changing services and treatment options to those affected by breast cancer. According to the <u>American Cancer Society</u>, in 2019 there will be an estimated 268,600 new cases nationally of invasive breast cancer diagnosed in women, with 1,010 of those in Rhode Island alone, and 2,670 cases diagnosed in men.

We are pleased to welcome Jamie Patterson, MD, fellowship-trained breast surgeon and medical director of The Breast Health Center at Kent Hospital.

Dr. Patterson earned her medical degree at the University of Nevada School of Medicine. She was inducted into Alpha Omega Alpha (AOA), the only national medical honor society, as a lifetime member in her junior year. Dr. Patterson completed an obstetrics and gynecology residency program at the University of California Irvine, where she received numerous awards for surgical excellence and continued on as assistant clinical professor and academic teaching faculty for the program. She completed further training in breast surgical oncology through the University

of Southern California/Hoag Breast Oncology Fellowship Program under the renowned breast surgeon, Dr. Melvin Silverstein, who pioneered oncoplastic breast surgery in the United States.

In addition to her leadership role at Kent Hospital, Dr. Patterson serves as an assistant clinical professor of surgery at The Warren Alpert Medical School of Brown University and assists in training residents and fellows in the Women & Infants Hospital Breast Fellowship Program. She is also an active member in several professional organizations including the American Society of Breast Surgeons, Society of Surgical Oncology, and American College of Obstetrics and Gynecologists. She has extensive experience in breast-conserving surgery, oncoplastic breast surgery, skin and nipple-sparing mastectomies, pregnancy-associated breast cancer, hidden- scar surgeries, as well as young and high-risk women.

With a strong background in women's health, she provides a unique holistic approach to breast care. She focuses on breast disease, surgical management of breast cancer, inherited breast cancer syndromes, and sexual health and menopause in cancer survivorship.

A message from the CNE Compliance Department

Recently, the Compliance Department received a notice from the Office of Civil Rights (OCR), the federal agency charged with enforcement of the HIPAA regulations, about a privacy violation complaint concerning the faxing or mailing of protected health information (PHI). Fortunately, the OCR closed this case as an informal complaint. That said, this complaint underscores our need to be vigilant and check twice before sending or handling PHI, whether it be when handing off to patients or sending through the mail, fax, or email. As a health care system as a whole, it is imperative that we ensure our patients and their private health information are always secure.

To prevent such instances from recurring, please review the reminders included below to refresh yourselves on the guidance rules in place to comply with HIPAA regulations:

- Always check twice and give once. Check all patients' materials before giving them to the patient(s), patients' personal representative(s), or when faxing, mailing, or emailing PHI from CNE or its operating units.
- When emailing PHI from CNE or its operating units, be sure to include PHI in the subject line to encrypt the message.
- Check two patient identifiers every time before handing or sending materials with PHI such as prescriptions, discharge summaries, immunization records, lab slips, etc.
- Ensure the name and date of birth of the patient matches the information on the above-listed materials.
- Check all pages of the patients' materials to ensure that the right patient receives the right materials. Giving a patient PHI belonging to another patient is a HIPAA violation.

Please take the time to re-familiarize yourselves with these regulations. It is not only our duty to provide quality health care to our patients, but also to make sure their privacy is always protected.

Butler Hospital education fair: October 17 through 23

Applications for the **2019 Constance A. Howes Women's Health Innovation Research Fund (CAH Fund)** Grant Program are now being accepted. The CAH Fund, generously supported by donors to Women & Infants Hospital, fosters innovative research leading to significant advances in women's health. Both basic science and clinical research projects are encouraged. Finalists will be invited to present their projects to a panel of scientific advisors and donors to the CAH Fund. The fund honors the vision and leadership of Connie Howes and provides seed funding for pilot studies that propel research ideas to the next level of funding. The fund has supported nine highly innovative projects so far and leveraged multiple publications and additional grant awards.
