HELP YOUR K-12 CUSTOMERS PUT FEDERAL MONEY TO WORK

Help your schools improve HVAC efficiency and indoor air quality so students can return.

We all want to see schools reopen – yet we know it must be done safely. For schools and school boards, figuring out how can feel daunting.

Fortunately, help is available. Beyond the CARES Act, the federal government has approved nearly \$177 billion in relief funds to improve and maintain air quality in K-12 schools. And we're here to help you decipher the process, understand how to help schools leverage the funds and determine which improvements qualify.

FEDERAL RELIEF FOR SCHOOLS

In 2020, Congress passed two stimulus bills – the CARES Act and CRRSA Act. In 2021, Congress passed the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act.* These bills provide education relief, including funds to safely reopen schools.

The funds for K-12 schools are known as "Elementary and Secondary Emergency Education Relief" fund or ESSER.

HOW FUNDS CAN BE USED

ESSER has spending deadlines in 2022 and 2023, so the agencies involved are ready and motivated to help schools reopen. These funds can be used for school repairs and improvements such as air conditioning, heating, and ventilation projects that improve indoor air quality.

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HOW TO APPLY FOR RELIEF FUNDS

The US Department of Education uses a proportional formula to provide grants to State Education Agencies (SEAs). State agencies then award grants to Local Education Agencies (LEAs), which includes K–12 public school districts as well as charter schools that qualify as "LEAs."

- 1. States must award grants within one year or return them for reallocation.
- 2. Local Education Authorities (LEAs) should apply now via their state's Department of Education website.
- 3. Grants are then obligated through contracts for qualifying projects.
